Dear Parishioners,

A responsibility I take most seriously is keeping you informed on the financial health of our parish. This annual report is critical to that effort. Through this report your parish leadership is held accountable to the financial support you have entrusted to us. I am pleased to share this year's report with you.

Our Lady of Perpetual Help Parish is an amazing and blessed place. Literally thousands of people are touched by our liturgies and outreach. From the baptism of a newborn to the celebration of a person's life at a funeral, the parish is a place of support, encouragement and challenge.

The investment it takes for our parish to meet its obligations and to keep growing can be overwhelming. I have to keep remembering that this parish flourishes because Jesus Christ is proclaimed. Our parish keeps flourishing because deeply committed parishioners make extraordinary sacrifices.

In calculating your stewardship of the parish it is important to realize that 6% of our weekly collection goes to the First Fruits Program. This program eliminated most second collections and encourages a spirituality of stewardship for all our needs here and beyond. Gifts from the General Offertory allow us to assist our sharing parishes,

support religious retirement and seminarians as well as respond to special needs that surface during the year like relief to hurricane and earthquake tragedies in the world.

If you have not participated in the Planned Offertory Program (P.O.P.) in the past, please consider it for this year. It is so important to planning our budget and being able to offer so many important ministries.

We recently had a diocesan meeting here that included people from over 30 parishes. I was struck at how many of our guests commented on what a beautiful place our parish is. Indeed it is and with your generous support this past year we not only maintained it, but addressed several projects that needed attention.

Our Parish Transformation Initiative that we participated in this past year evoked the powerful impact this parish has had on many generations. As beautiful as our campus is, it is the people that are our greatest treasure.

How does the Offertory benefit the First Fruits Program?

Comprised of Sunday, Christmas and Easter collections, the *General Offertory* supports all parish ministries and the First Fruits Program. In combination with the *Planned Offering Program*, Its the most important resource we have for planning and giving to our larger community.

It directly benefits the First Fruits Program by eliminating all but three 2nd collections annually. Instead we are able to support many worthy causes by giving 6% of our general and planned offertories toward causes supported by the First Fruits Program.



^{*} The Wagner Trust is based on the trusts of the late Peter and Rose Wagner. The parish receives an annual distribution of 5% of the trust principal balance as of the previous calendar year.

Your sacrificial gifts make all the difference to a vibrant parish like OLPH. Each week our staff and ministries are able to serve our parish with all the resources needed. If you haven't considered the Planned Offering Program, please take a look. It is a critical piece of information for planning.

Planned Offertory Program

Each fall we invite you to reflect on your blessings. You are then asked to prayerfully consider a sacrificial gift to the General Offertory for the coming year and return a form stating your intention. By making a commitment to the Planned Offertory Program (P.O.P.) you are helping the Finance Council to budget responsibly. Last year parishioners committed approximately \$1.3 million to the P.O.P. which allowed us to plan prudently.

Through the P.O.P. you can opt-in to our Automated Giving system. This means no more envelopes to keep track of. Watch for more details about the Planned Offertory this October.

The General Offertory, or Sunday Collection, is our single largest source of income. It is vital to all of our efforts. We cannot overemphasize the importance of your gifts to the Offertory.

Your contributions to the General Offertory are used to fund parish ministries, pay salaries, maintain our buildings and fund our School and Religious Education Programs. **We have also set aside** 6% of the Offertory for our First Fruits Program.

Our mission reflects our Gospel values: to grow in faith together, to educate our young and to reach out to the needy. Without a financially stable parish, this would not be possible.

With the addition of the Loyola Press Finding God curriculum this year for grades Kindergarten through 7th grades, Decision Point for 7th grade and continued use of Chosen for 8th grade, we have been able to:

Religious Ed works hard to demonstrate the importance of service as well as learning about our faith. Several times throughout the year, we work on projects to benefit the parish and community.

Religious Ed Program grows again

The Religious Education Program at OLPH provides children and youth in grades Kindergarten through 8th grade, in cooperation with their families, an opportunity to deepen their Catholic faith and identity through prayer, study and community service. This instruction with participation at weekend Mass and faith formation has the goal of leading our young people to a deeper relationship with God and the Church.

With the dedication of 90 catechists and 400 additional volunteers OLPH has continued to provide children and youth with the knowledge, experiences and skills necessary to become faithful disciples of Jesus Christ. When we share our faith with others, we share in Jesus'

own mission of proclaiming the Kingdom of God. Great care is taken with the nearly 1,000 children and youth to help ensure a life of strong faith.

Religious Education is a continuous, lifelong process. Our Lady of Perpetual Help continues to strive to provide an atmosphere of faith, love and compassion to welcome and support children and families. Beginning with the faith received in Baptism, we seek to collaborate with parents and the parish community to teach children the gospel message and experience a sense of community. We celebrate the Sacraments and learn the truths of our Catholic Faith.



Sharing marks 34 years of ministry

Our Lady of Perpetual Help continues to be generous in responding to the escalating need within our communities. We provide support to four inner-city sharing parishes and beyond, while also addressing needs within our own parish and community. Glenview has over 2,500 food insecure residents, many of whom draw from the Sharing Room shelves as a source of support.

Campus improvements continue to shape the future of ministry offerings

We were blessed last year with a mild winter. Because of this along with the continued generosity of you, the parishioners, we were able to do some needed work on our campus. It is our responsibility to leave the wonderful campus we inherited in as good a shape as we found it. When you are visiting OLPH please take a minute to notice the capital projects we completed.

New Cupola on Rectory. Many of you may have noticed the dilapidated cupola on the Rectory roof. We have spent a couple of years discussing the pros & cons of elimination or replacement of it. Luckily, once we got up there we realized that it needed extensive repair but not replacement. It is an important architectural detail and it will look great for years to come.


Chimney & Masonry. The chimney on the east side of the Rectory had bowed and was leaking into the building. We rebuilt the chimney and also did other needed tuck pointing around the campus.

Playdium Stone Base Repair. The stone base on the north side of the Playdium has been showing signs of age for a while. We have patched it many times, trying to prevent leakage. This summer we replaced many of the panels. It looks terrific. Our hope is to complete the next phase of the project in the near future.

New Classroom Windows in the Playdium.

This summer, energy efficient windows were installed in the Playdium classrooms. These new windows provide cost savings as well as a quality learning environment for all. What a difference they make!

Reconfiguration of the parking lot behind the rectory. Our final project for this summer is to create additional spots for the handicapped and elderly. We will include a smooth path from the parking lot to the elevator.
