Dear Parishioners,

The Lord is Risen! Alleluia, Alleluia!

Happy Easter to you. From one corner of the world to the next, Christians proclaim the power of the risen Christ.

From suffering and death to risen glory, Easter calls us to newness of being. Where in your experiences is the invitation to new life yearning to be heard and embraced? Death never

gives way to new life easily. It is always a struggle. The faith in Easter life calls all of us to take the leap and allow the power of it to wash over us.

At the Vigil on Holy Saturday we experience the power of new life. We hear the biblical narrative that begins with the retelling of the creation of the world to the empty tomb. We see it when the church goes from darkness to brilliant light. We see it in the faces of those who were received into our community of faith.

I love Easter Sunday! It is great to see many families reunited. We celebrate with many of our neighbors and friends. In Glenview we join hands with the many Christian communities that are in our midst. Today, despite historical differences and theological challenges, we stand united proclaiming that Jesus Christ has risen from the dead.

As we look to the wonderful Easter Season, we will embrace the graces of many moments of new life. In the coming weeks scores of children will be baptized, 200 children will make their first Holy Communion, many couples will be married. In the Archdiocese deacons will be ordained to the priesthood and our own Christopher Weiland will be ordained to the diaconate.

The Archdiocese is entering an "Easter" moment through the efforts of Renew My Church. This initiative by Cardinal Cupich is challenging all parishes to explore ways to become more vital and life giving.

This will require us to work more strategically with our neighboring parishes. Nobody can go it alone. Although our grouping has not been activated, we have already enjoyed several wonderful events sponsored by, OLPH, the Catholic Community of Northbrook and St. Catherine Laboure.

Here at the parish we are laying the foundation for a vital youth ministry initiative. Getting our teens more connected is crucial to the future. I encourage you to share any of your concerns or ideas with our new youth minister, Randy McGraw.

We are now well into the second year of the capital campaign, To Teach Who Christ Is. We currently have \$5.2 million pledged. Forty percent of the money pledged goes to the Archdiocese, sixty percent stays here, as well as any additional pledges we receive. If you would like to participate please contact me.

The projects resulting from this campaign are transforming our parish. Already we have provided a new residence for the Sisters. We have added hearing loop technology to the Church and upgraded the Church sound system. We have replaced the plaza and stairs in front of the church and rectory. We have a new religious education center and youth ministry center. We have centralized the professional staff on the second floor of the Parish Ministry Center and added a new conference room. Hickey Hall has become the most popular room on campus. We have a new STEM lab up and running in the school.

Later this spring we will install a handicap ramp for accessibility to the Parish Ministry Center. We will also hire a consultant to help assess the potential scope of renovating McDonnell Hall, the third floor of the Parish Ministry Center and the Glenview Road entrance. We hope to expand the number of STEM labs.

The new life of Easter has blessed our parish since the day we were formed in 1919. Far more powerful than buildings are the people that have so devotedly supported this parish. We proclaim the Risen Christ in deed and action!

Dear Sisters and Brothers in the Risen Lord Jesus,

The news today seems to be dominated by death-dealing forces and foreclosed possibilities. This past year has brought us a plague of gun-violence, streams of helpless refugees in different parts of the world, struggles in our own nation around questions of immigration and racism, countless victims of natural disasters, and large numbers of people who are—in the words of Pope Francis— “discarded.” There seems to be scant room for hope and optimism.

Yet, we know by our own experience as believers and our common bonds of faith that this is not the full story of reality. There, indeed, is other news, the good news of our Easter faith. Christ has conquered all death and evil. Christ is risen!

When we profess our faith in the risen Lord, we do not deny the pain and suffering at work in our world. The risen Christ himself bears his wounds of his suffering, but he is risen. He has conquered sin and death, and our victory is certain. We hold a great hope in him who leads forward. But, it does not end there, for as St. Paul tells us, all of that we celebrate in these days has taken place so that we “might live no longer for ourselves but for him who died for our sakes and was raised.”

In the Archdiocese of Chicago, our commitment to *Renew My Church* means that we take our Easter faith seriously to the point that it becomes the source of new energy for communities and individuals who share our faith with the world and bring it hope the world cannot take away.

May our faith in the Risen Lord be alive in our hearts, and may we share that gift widely and generously with others.

Evolve Ministry Presents: Art Historian Jeff Mishur

Wednesday, April 18, 7:00-8:30 pm, McDonnell Hall

Art of the Reformation-How Martin Luther Changed the History of Art

Prior to the Protestant Reformation, Christian religious art was primarily, and almost exclusively, sponsored by the Catholic Church. Those with opportunity to visit European cathedrals and art museums may have witnessed the glorious works – paintings, sculpture and mosaics – by renowned artists such as Michaelangelo, Caravaggio, Raphael, Da Vinci, and Donatello to name a few. Predominant themes, including Madonna and Child, Crucifixion, Annunciation, Last Supper, and biblical figures like David, Moses and John the Baptist, were a means to convey a visual catechesis to the population that was unable to read and at a time when printed materials were rare.

Within his visual presentation, art historian Jeff Mishur discusses the impact Luther and the Protestant movement had on the history of art. From the destruction of works of art (iconoclasm) during a time of religious turmoil to the impact of the Reformation and Counter Reformation on art throughout Europe, this program promises to offer insight into a remarkable moment in history. Changes in financial sponsorship and theological premises led to new subject themes and new schools of artists and broadened the scope of artistic exploration and interpretation.



Training: Extraordinary Ministers of Eucharist to the Sick



Ministers of Care bring Holy Communion to parishioners who are homebound, living in nursing homes, or in the hospital. They share the word of God in scripture, pray with them for the Church and the world, and offer companionship. Through the Ministry of Care, we are able to keep long-time parishioners of OLPH connected and active in our faith community.

The work of the Ministry of Care is open to all members of our parish community. A training course for new Ministers of Care begins on Thursday, April 12 and continues over five successive Thursday evenings. Each session focuses on an aspect of the Ministry of Care; however, the unifying thread woven throughout is a commitment to developing the skills and confidence needed to be a source of comfort to those who are sick. Each weekly, 2-hour session is facilitated by Rick Nash and retired priests who live at Presence St. Benedict Home in Niles. Completion of this course qualifies you to receive the Archdiocesan mandate to bring Communion to the sick, homebound and hospitalized of our parish.

Snapshots of His Great Love



I've always loved photos. In our house, we love looking back at pictures of when my girls were younger – much younger, when it was okay to dress them in matching Easter finery. The smiling faces and coordinating outfits, the perfectly selected backdrops and unopened Easter baskets propped perfectly between them. It had to be perfect, but was it? Is everyone's life as picture perfect as it

may seem? Perhaps, but I'm certain most are not. We all have hurts, disappointments, frustrations and seemingly unanswered prayers. Because, you know, that's life. It unravels. The camera rarely captures those moments.

Recently I was privileged to be a part of a celebration in the life of a very special family. It was a gathering to celebrate a baptism and first communion. It was a mix of emotions, perhaps hard to fully celebrate the joy these sacraments bring. It took place in an assisted living home where their Nana lived as her health had continued to decline. It was important for this family to gather and to celebrate, even when life, lately, hadn't been so pretty. It was a moment to reflect on all that is right in the world, especially when so much seems so wrong.

The space designated as the altar, was covered in a pristine white cloth. Flowers and candles decorated the space surrounding. The family gathered close near the altar, while Nana was in her place off to the side of the room, with a perfect view of her beautiful family gathered on this day. The celebration began with the readings followed by droplets of water and oil on a forehead as a Baptism was celebrated. Soon after, the Eucharist in the golden chalice was consecrated as it was lifted high with outstretched arms above the

priest's head as two special children received the Body of Christ for the first time. Recalling the richness of this simply powerful celebration, I couldn't help but think of the Easter Vigil and how the two experiences were so similar; both so deep in meaning and ritual.

His Great Love was everywhere that day; in the family pictures and children's artwork that hung on the walls, in the little touches that made the room feel like home and in the sunlight streaming in through the large windows. We prayed the Lord's Prayer as tears sprang forth. The cameras continued to click, no filters and no cropping to mask the imperfections. The cameras took pictures of the families gathered in love, unedited and raw with emotion. Joy with tears, peace where there was pain and light in the dark.

I won't soon forget that day, made even more special by the personal moments I was invited to share with this family. One moment, frozen in time — through both the camera images and the tender places in their hearts where they hold tight the memory of this day forever. We all have so many of those snapshot moments in our memory; I wouldn't trade them for the world. I let them sink in deep and replay them often; thinking about exactly how many pictures it really took to get one good one of my girls on Easter morning. Sometimes I regret not stopping after the first one and capturing life's stories – unedited, because my family is far from perfect. Both sides of the camera tell the true story of the lives we lead. Tears mixed with joy. Seeking beauty in front of us while wanting desperately to turn our backs and run away from the sadness and pain around us. And that's okay. Because, you know, that's life. It unravels.

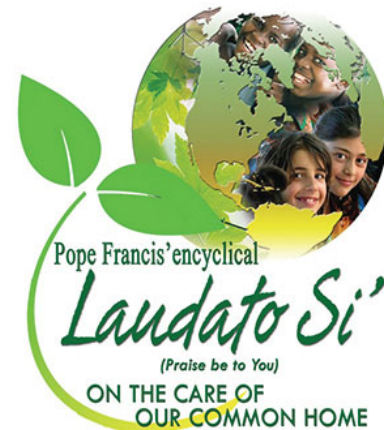
Movie Screening
