

Dear parishioners,

This weekend we celebrate the third Sunday of Easter, in which the risen Lord helps us to understand God's plan in our lives. Through the disciples' experiences, Jesus wants us to reflect on what His resurrection means for us, and what implications it brings to our daily lives.

Life is a mystery; we prepare agendas, set forth our plans, mark our calendars and then the unexpected happens. Life is filled with surprises; you might speak of your own experience. It could be that something unexpected happened during spring break that gave you a new insight on how things work. It could be that a friend, or even a stranger, said something to you that changed the way you think. It could be that God spoke to you in prayer and now you feel more confident embracing your faith. It could be the illness, or even death, of a loved one. These experiences constantly transform our lives. Although our greatest hopes and dreams might never be realized, and our biggest fears and worries might never cease, there is always change around us. Our task is to discern the changes presented to us and ask ourselves what to do with them.

This was precisely the challenge of the disciples. They had dreams and hopes for a worldly king of Israel, which never came true because that wasn't God's plan. They had fears and worries in following Jesus,

which never went away, because they needed to trust more. And now, after his death and resurrection, they don't know what to do with the unexpected.

The two disciples who recognized the Lord at the breaking of the bread ran back to Jerusalem to tell the other disciples that they have seen the risen Lord. Where would they go? What would they do? These are not the questions anymore, they know exactly where to go and exactly what to do.

They have the strength to go and speak of Jesus. They have the courage to go and announce his resurrection. They have the confidence to trust in his word. Jesus is in their midst opening up their minds and hearts to understand the scriptures, which is God's plan. The unexpected change began to make sense now. They were able to look beyond their suffering. They were able to look beyond their loss and failure. They were able to look beyond even the death of the Lord. This is the turning point in the lives of the disciples. They found a new life, a new beginning, a resurrection.

We, just like the disciples, celebrate these Easter mysteries. We are guided by Jesus to the life to come – with new hope, new dreams, new strengths and renewed faith to share His love with each other. It is now us who encounter Jesus at the Eucharistic table, a new Easter every Sunday. Jesus appears in our midst, and it is then when we experience His forgiveness. He calms our fears and worries, opens our minds and hearts to the scriptures, brings peace to our lives, and shares his body and blood so we might have eternal life.

Let us rejoice and be glad in the risen Lord!


Earth Day Retreat

Evolve Ministry Presents: Art Historian Jeff Mishur

Art of the Reformation-How Martin Luther Changed the History of Art

Prior to the Protestant Reformation, Christian religious art was primarily, and almost exclusively, sponsored by the Catholic Church. Those with opportunity to visit European cathedrals and art museums may have witnessed the glorious works – paintings, sculpture and mosaics – by renowned artists such as Michaelangelo, Caravaggio, Raphael, Da Vinci, and Donatello to name a few. Predominant themes, including Madonna and Child, Crucifixion, Annunciation. Last Supper, and biblical figures like David, Moses and John the Baptist, were a means to convey a visual catechesis to the population that was unable to read and at a time when printed materials were rare.

Within his visual presentation, art historian Jeff Mishur discusses the impact Luther and the Protestant movement had on the history of art. From the destruction of works of art (iconoclasm) during a time of religious turmoil to the impact of the Reformation and Counter Reformation on art throughout Europe, this program promises to offer insight into a remarkable moment in history. Changes in financial sponsorship and theological premises led to new subject themes and new schools of artists and broadened the scope of artistic exploration and interpretation.




