

FROM OUR PASTOR

Dear Parishioners.

"It was the best of times; it was the worst of times..."

This opening line from Charles Dickens' book "A Tale of Two Cities" seems to capture for me the roller coaster of the past fiscal year.

We began the fiscal year with so much excitement regarding the centennial of the founding of OLPH in 1919. It seems like it was so long ago that we were celebrating with Cardinal Cupich, producing those beautiful videos and countless parishioners participating in the 100 Hours of Mercy initiative.

Then came the COVID pandemic which changed everything. The lockdown severely limited our pastoral life as well as everything else.

OLPH was founded amid the Spanish flu epidemic which ravaged the world. Many would have thought that founding a parish amid a pandemic was not the best time to do this. Look at what evolved from that precarious beginning! OLPH is an extraordinary parish that has established itself as one of the most vibrant parishes. This is because of you, our founding parishioners and the power of our faith in Jesus Christ.

I am honored to present this Annual Report to you. It attempts to summarize the many aspects of parish life that you have supported in this most challenging time. Your financial support and stewardship of OLPH are great blessings.

With the lockdown and the very slow process of reopening, we have had to face the reality of few people being able to support the parish through Sunday collections. Fundraising is practically at a standstill.

Despite that, so many of you have signed up for GiveCentral, have faithfully mailed in your weekly donations, and have maintained your support of the parish.

We were able to receive a loan through the Payroll Protection Plan that stabilized our finances. We did not have to lay off anyone. We have about 120 employees. We are in the process of having that loan forgiven.

As 421 cars passed in the procession, it was a great way for our priests to reconnect face-to-face with parishioners, some of whom they hadn't seen since the beginning of the COVID pandemic in March.

We have had to make a substantial investment in COVID related infrastructure to make our Church and facilities as safe as possible. From retrofitting the church to livestreaming Masses, to portable sinks in all the classrooms, to enhancing our air purification systems, it has been a remarkable process.

I am so grateful for your support, your passionate love of this parish and your commitment to make the sacrifices we need to make, as we navigate these uncertain waters.

While routines have changed, we proclaim the Gospel, we form our young people, we continue our witness to the Love of Jesus Christ.

I have a responsibility to share with you the financial and spiritual well being of OLPH. These pages tell that story.

As we begin the new fiscal year, I welcome all newcomers to OLPH; I welcome Mary Lynne Januszewski, our new Director of Finance and Operations, Fr. Larry Basbas, our new Associate Pastor and Margaret Waldron, our new Director of Religious Education.

We miss both of them and pray for them on their new journeys.






Father John Edward Flavin returned home to God on May 30, 2020 at age 83. He

GENERAL OFFERTORY AND PLANNED GIVING

An Invitation to Stewardship

As our single largest source of income, the General Offertory, or Sunday Collection, is vital to all of our efforts. We cannot overemphasize the importance of your gifts to the Offertory.

Your contributions to the General Offertory are used to fund parish ministries, pay salaries, maintain our buildings and fund our school and religious education program. We also set aside six percent of the Offertory for our First Fruits Program.

Our parish mission reflects the Gospel values: to grow in faith together, to educate our young and to reach out to the needy. Without a financially stable parish, this would not be possible.

Each fall, we invite you to reflect on your blessings. You are then asked to prayerfully consider a sacrificial gift to the General Offertory for the coming year and return a form stating your intention. By making a commitment to the Planned Offertory Program, you are helping our Finance Council to budget responsibly.

Over two years, parishioners have committed an average of \$1 million per year to the Planned Offertory Program, which allowed us to plan prudently.

In 2019, we contracted with GiveCentral to begin accepting online donations. This secure online portal enables parishioners and even visitors to our church to make paperless donations on either a recurring basis or as a one-time contribution.

Donations can even be made via cell phone. Processing donations through GiveCentral is much more cost effective than paper checks or credit card transactions. Since the pandemic began, we have seen an increase in the number of parishioners who use this portal. This has allowed us to more efficiently plan out our monthly budget for the entire year.

We encourage all parishioners, if you have not yet done so, as well as parish organizations, to take advantage of this service.

NEEDY FAMILY FUND

Sister Paulanne's Needy Family Fund Serves 135 Families

At this point last year, the Needy Family Fund was making great strides assisting some clients to gain independence. Many of our clients were needing less support from the fund as they found employment, higher paying jobs or increasing their hours. For everyone, 2020 has brought great challenges especially to those already in great need. The Needy Family Fund had to adapt and responded differently from some practices in the past. Stimulus checks, grants for rent, moratorium on evictions, and utility companies extending the time to pay bills all helped. We are very grateful to all those who dropped/ sent gift cards to Mary Anne Bobrinskoy so they could be mailed to clients in the program. This social distancing practice decreases the exposure for both the clients and those at OLPH.

As we know public assistance resources have slowed significantly. We are so grateful to the parishioners of OLPH who continue to support the NFF.

PROVEN BEST PRACTICES IN ASSISTANCE AND STEWARDSHIP CONTINUE FOR SR. PAULANNE'S NEEDY FAMILY FUND

- Client intake with licensed social worker to build a budget and plan to self sufficiency
- Clients meet weekly to monthly, in person, as needed with social worker, to assist with budget and services
- Sr. Paulanne, social worker and committee meets weekly for client update and disbursement approval.
- All bills reviewed in detail, paid directly to the provider, and all disbursements tracked per client
- Utilization of all available public assistance (Required)
- Access to Catholic Charities Network and Services (i.e. counseling)

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Inviting Children and Families into Relationship with Christ

Faith formation is a relationship experience. Our Religious Education Program focuses on Catholic doctrine in an environment that reinforces Christian virtues bringing students to a better understanding of their faith and strengthening their relationship with Christ. Our faith formation program invites young people to encounter Christ in their lives through instruction, liturgy and prayer, sacraments, service, and partnership.

INSTRUCTION

Using Loyola Press, Finding God, a spiral curriculum in the catechesis of children and young adolescents, students revisit concepts and vocabulary from one year to the next. It incorporates scripture, church, tradition, prayer and sacred art in every lesson. As children progress through grade levels, their knowledge and experiences of these concepts broaden and deepen. A well-developed, eight-year program encompassing Catholic doctrine, truths, and traditions, ensures a solid foundation is established.

LITURGY AND PRAYER

We had 720 students participating in weekly classroom prayer and monthly liturgy or prayer services as a community. A deep, lasting relationship with God requires continuous learning, formal and informal. We helped students achieve this by teaching and encouraging daily prayer and weekly participation in the Mass with the reception of the Sacraments of Reconciliation and Holy Eucharist.

SACRAMENTS

While First Reconciliation and Communion preparation begins in first grade, children in second grade celebrated the Sacraments of Reconciliation and First Holy Communion utilizing the Loyola Press, God's Gifts curriculum.

Spring 2020 First Communion and Confirmation ceremonies had to be rescheduled due to the COVID pandemic. Both first communicants and confirmandi were broken into smaller groups to adhere to Archdiocese protocals. Because there was a limitation of having only 80 people in church at a time, more than 10 first communion and 10 confirmation ceremonies took place from August through November 2020. Fr. Jerry Boland celebrated all Confirmation liturgies in place of the bishop, and Fr. Patrick Kizza, Fr. Larry Basbas and Fr. Jim Barrett celebrated all First Communion Masses.

SERVICE

Students live their faith through service to others. Our community-wide approach, combining service and learning, promotes empathy and respect for others. As catechists help students to reflect on their service, they tie in Christian virtues emphasizing our call to respond to the needs of others as Jesus did. 38 Years of Serving the Needy

The Sharing Room was shut down by the state in mid-March, but much was accomplished before that time and much has been happening despite the room's closure.

- Food Total: 98,836 non-perishable food items
- Number of organizations/agencies served through Sharing Ministry: 29

We serve the needs of our four sharing parishes first, St. Sabina, Our Lady of Tepeyac, St. Philip Neri, and St. James.

Overage is shared with other groups.

- Number of families served at holiday times through Befriend a Family: 168
- Brown bag lunches distributed to the hungry: over 3000
- Fed homeless at Catholic Charities/Des Plaines: over 500 meals served
- Bags of clothing/housewares sorted and distributed to needy: 6000
- · Picked up and distributed carloads of bread and perishables each week
- Worked with Women's Club, Men's Club, School, RE and other parish groups in facilitating the distribution of goods taken in through drives they organized.

The generosity of our parish is overwhelming, and giving has remained strong despite the challenges brought on by COVID.

INNOVATIVE WAYS TO WORSHIP

The COVID crisis is no match for a faith community as strong as the one here at OLPH. We innovated. We adapted. We embraced technology and new ways to worship. We have become stronger.

In June, we had our First Annual Drive-By Father's Day/Family Blessings and Communion celebration. On Saturday, July, 4, 2020, we started holding our Saturday evening Drive-In Mass. It has been a full house every Saturday.

A number of ministries have taken the leap and gone completely electronic. SPRED is reunited. Our Religious Education program is forging ahead with a dynamic online program. Our Scripture Study Ministry launched a bible overview study called Genesis to Jesus that they stream over the internet. They have over 200 participants meeting in 15 separate Zoom groups each week! PPC meetings and other ministry boards have resumed on Zoom. Men's CRHP blessed us with a 10-day virtual retreat. We even have Zoom devotionals for Divine Mercy Holy Hour and parish-wide Rosary.

These are just some of the examples of how well our parishioners have responded to the COVID crisis. We have found ways to pray together, work together, and support one another. The Holy Spirit has shown us new ways to live as the Body of Christ, and for that we praise God for his goodness and loving care.

100 YEARS OF GRACE: OUR CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION



In the summer of 2019, our parish began preparations for recognizing and giving gratitude for 100 Years of Grace at OLPH. From a humble start as a mission church of St. Joseph Parish in Wilmette, OLPH evolved into a permanent parish in October of 1919. Over the last 100

years, our church grew, prospered and persevered through triumphs and trials. We were overjoyed to mark the Centennial Jubilee as a parish family in 2019 and into 2020.



When COVID hit in mid-March we were forced to close the church. Remarkably, we were up and running with online Masses available for viewing from our YouTube channel within one week of the shutdown. In fact, we were one of the first parishes in the archdiocese to be able to provide this service during the pandemic.


