PREFACE

- The best-selling book of all time is the Bible. It is impossible to know exactly how many copies have been printed in the roughly 1,500 years since its contents were standardized, but research conducted by the British and Foreign Bible Society in 2021 suggests that the total number probably lies between 5 and 7 billion copies.
- Approximately 100 million Bibles are printed each year.

Historical

- Patriarchs Founding Fathers of Judaism
 - "Covenant"
 - Abraham 2000 BC
 - Isaac 1900 BC
 - Jacob 1800 BC
- Jews in Egypt
 - Jacob's descendants 1800-1400 BC
 - Moses and the Exodus 1400-1360 BC
- Jews return to Canaan 1360 BC

Biblical

- Pentateuch (aka Torah)— First 5 Books (Greek for "five books")
 - Attributed to Moses
 - Earliest version, 950 BC, Major edit 500's BC

^{*}All the dates shown are simplified for ease of general understanding. (Scholars differ on dates)

Historical

- Jews in Canaan 12 Tribes, 2 kingdoms,
 12 Judges 1360-1000 BC
- Reign of David 1000-960 BC
 - Warrior, King, Musician, Poet
 - Writes the Psalms
- Reign of Solomon 960-930 BC
 - Builds the First Temple
 - Writes Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Song of Songs and Book of Wisdom
- Reign of multiple kings –930-721 BC

Biblical

- Historical Books 950 BC
 - Authorship: Joshua, Samuel, Nathan and others
- Wisdom Books 950 BC
 - Authorship: David, Solomon and others

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Historical

- Collapse of the Kingdoms
 - Northern Kingdom Israel 721 BC (Assyrians)
 - Southern Kingdom Judah 586 BC (Babylonians)
- Return to Judah (aka Judea) 538 BC (Persians)
 - Three returning waves
 - Second Temple is constructed

Biblical

- Prophetic Books 740-530 BC
 - Authorship: Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekial and others

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Historical

- Jewish Resettlement in Judea 538-333 BC
 - Settling into the region
 - Growing conflict with Samaria
- Greek/Roman Rule—333 BC 136 AD
 - Maccabean Revolt 167-160 BC
 - Hasmonean Rule 160-37 BC
 - Herodian Rule 37 BC-4 AD

Biblical

- Hebrew Bible, "Tanakh", takes shape 500's BC
 - Torah (Law) 5 books
 - Nevi'im (Prophets) 8 books
 - Ketuvim (Writings) 11 books
- Biblical Novellas 300-100 BC
 - Authorship: Tobit, Judith, Esther and others
- Septuagint 250 BC?
 - Greek version of Hebrew Bible "popular" text
 - Favored by early Christians, becomes the Old Testament
- Hebrew Bible Canon 100's BC?
 - Masoretic Text -"official" text of Rabbinic Judaism
 - Excludes some books in the Septuagint

Septuagint and Hebrew Canon was known to Jesus, Paul, and Apostles

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HISTORY OF THE BIBLE – AFTER AUTHORSHIP

Ecclesiastic Events

- Corpus of the New Testament formed 100-382
- Council of Rome Canon of the Bible 382
- St. Jerome translates the Bible, Greek to Latin 383-405
- Protestant Reformation starts 1517
 - Luther removes non-Hebrew books from OT
- Catholic Bible canon confirmed by the Council of Trent in 1546
- Pope Pius XII (1943), Vatican II (1966) biblical scholarship flourishes, multiple versions

Bible Version

- Vulgate— Official Latin Bible 405
- Gutenberg Bible (Latin) 1455

- Douay-Rheims Bible (English) Catholic Vulgate 1609
- King James Bible Protestant Vulgate 1611 (revised1885-English Revised Version)
- American Standard Version (Prot) trans. from original Greek and Hebrew texts — 1901

WHERE ARE WE TODAY?

DIFFERING VIEWS, SIMILAR TRANSLATIONS

Interpretation Differences

- Catholic vs Protestant Bible Perspectives
 - Catholics: Scriptural interpretation from the Magisterium
 - Protestants: Individual interprets and decides
 - (Note: Protestant Bibles exclude 6 OT books)

Translation Similarities

- Academic—strict word-for-word translation
- Faith-Based—modified text to convey meaning
- Cultural—gender neutral
- Ease of Understanding—modern word usage
- Age-Appropriate—child friendly

CATHOLIC OPTIONS

Translation Versions

- NABRE New American Bible Revised Edition
 - USCCB Approved, used at Mass, Academic footnotes
- RSV2CE Revised Standard Version 2nd Catholic Edition
 - Popular academic translation, no footnotes
- NRSVCE New Revised Standard Version Catholic Edition
 - Similar to RSV2CE, but Gender neutral
- NCB New Catholic Bible
 - Similar to NABRE, newer, faith-based footnotes
- RNJB Revised New Jerusalem Bible
 - Preferred by clergy in Europe and Asia
- DRV <u>D</u>ouay-<u>R</u>heims <u>V</u>ersion Bible
 - Old English, only Catholic Vulgate, last revision:1752

READING THE BIBLE

...FROM PASSIVE LISTENING, TO ACTIVE READING

"Purposeful Reading" The Word of God

- Where to start
 - Join a group study?
 - Reading on your own?
 - Reading beginning to end— Beware!
 - (Start easy: Gospels, Proverbs, Genesis)
- · Where to read
 - Home? Church? On the way to work?
- When
 - Whenever the Spirit moves you
 - Scheduled time/day. Before Mass?
- How long and how fast?
 - Depends on the text
 - How much time to you have?
 - Highlighting or note-taking




STUDYING THE BIBLE

- Incorporating Context
 - Where in the corpus
 - Time and place of authorship
 - Author's literary purpose the message – and format
 - Historical (world) context
 - Alterations or edits over time
 - Scholarly Interpretation or conjecture (commentaries)
 - Archeological discoveries and insights
 - Culture and customs
- Catholic Faith and Tradition
- Lectio Divina





- 1. Catholic Bible
- 2. Translation
 - NABRE New American Bible, Revised Edition (St. Joseph Edition)
 - official Mass readings, USCCB approved
 - Academic commentary footnotes
 - RSV2CE Revised Standard Version-2nd Catholic Edition (Great Adventure Bible)
 - Most popular academic translation, audio versions
 - No commentary footnotes
 - NRSVCE New Revised Standard Version-Catholic Edition (Multiple publishers)
 - Same as above
 - Culturally oriented gender neutral
 - NCB (St. Joseph Edition of New Catholic Bible)
 - Easier to read version of NABRE
 - Commentary footnotes are more faith-based
- Hard Copy
 - Text size, print size, use of color
 - Paper weight, tabbing, margins for notes
- 4. "Feel"
- Budget (see Amazon)

6:54-58 <i>Eats</i> : the verb used in these verses is not the classical Greek verb used of human eating, but that of animal eating: "munch," "gnaw." This may be part of John's emphasis on the reality of the flesh and blood of Jesus, but the same verb eventually became the ordinary verb in the Greek meaning "eat." NABRE	transubstantiation (professed by the Catholic and Orthodox churches), ignore Jesus' statement that "the flesh counts for nothing" (John 6:63). The majority of Protestants understand that Jesus was speaking metaphorically about His flesh and blood and hold that the bread and wine are symbolic of the spiritual bond created with Christ through faith. https://www.gotquestions.org/Jesus-eat-flesh-drink-blood.html		

NEW TESTAMENT TIMELINE

- The first listing of the New Testament canon of 27 books was in Athanasius's Easter Letter (367 AD)
- Council of Rome Canon of the Bible 382
- Chapter system introduced in the early 1200s
- First printed Bibles (Gutenberg Bible) were produced in 1455
- Protestant Reformation started in 1517
- Catholic Bible canon confirmed by the Council of Trent in 1546
- Verse divisions in 1551 for NT; Geneva Bible of 1560 included verses in OT & NT
